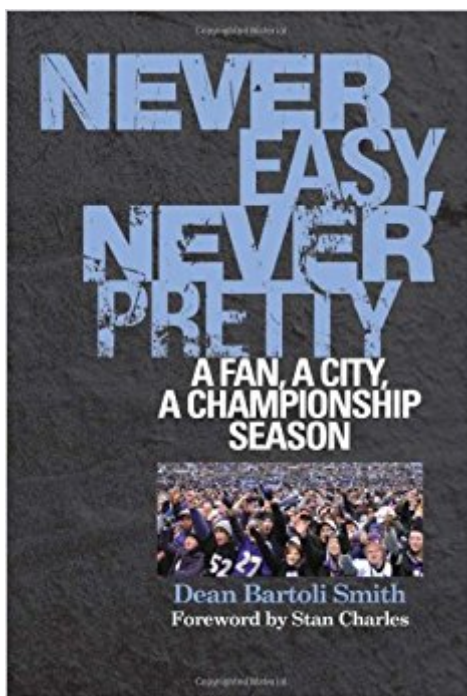


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Never Easy, Never Pretty: A Fan, A City, A Championship Season



Synopsis

When the Ravens won Super Bowl XLVII in New Orleans, it was a joyous moment for fans and team alike. For Dean Bartoli Smith, a lifelong Baltimore football fan and writer for *The Baltimore Brew* and *Press Box*, it was especially sweet. In *Never Easy, Never Pretty*, he recalls the ups and downs and ultimate thrills of a special season while also showing how a football team impacts its fans and its city. Smith recounts the season from start to glorious finish while interweaving Baltimore's professional football history, telling his own story of growing up with the Colts, then gradually transferring adult loyalties to the new team in town, the Ravens. Family, friends, and other fans share their recollections, too, letting us see how a football team becomes part of a community. Smith's game-by-game recounting of an improbable season brings back all the excitement and uncertainty as the team starts strong, wobbles, then finds its inspiration and character in the playoffs. For each game *Never Easy, Never Pretty* features a diverse array of quotes, interviews, and commentary from players, broadcasters, and executives, including Joe Flacco, Ray Lewis, Art Donovan, Kevin Byrne, Steve Bisciotti, and Ozzie Newsome. *Never Easy, Never Pretty* highlights the Ravens' electrifying season and celebrates a team, a city, and its emotional landscape during an unlikely run to a Super Bowl victory. This is a great gift for Ravens fans, especially those who are from Baltimore. It's not a groundbreaking piece of journalistic excellence but it has heart.

What an absolutely brilliant book. Smith didn't just write a book about a football team, he wrote about an entire city. His clever exploration of the economic, social, cultural and even religious (what football fan doesn't pray) aspects of the team and it's winning season is a lesson in unity, pure and simple. Baltimore's history, along with that of the author, plays as large a part in the story as the players and managers do. His description of football plays are so vivid that you can skip the films; you can sense the tension, feel the hits, smell the victory and jump with joy at every successful play. This just happens to be a book about football. It's much more a story of a tightly knit town that knows what it means to come back. Fans of football will love this; fans of Baltimore will adore it.

Full disclosure: Dean Smith is a friend and he excerpts a few lines from a poem of mine in this book. But further disclosure: I could care less about football, though I played it in school for eight years (and I TMd I TMd argue, in the carefree era the preceded the travesty of peewee leagues, I was a football player from the moment I held my first Nerf at approximately age 8). That is, I could care less, personally, about sports teams and fandom. So, I read this book because a friend wrote it who I know to be a good writer. And because I was hoping there was more in common in it with my 8-year-old self than my 45-year-old self. I wasn't disappointed. I TMll confess that the Introduction is my favorite part of the book and because it is that narrative intelligence and personality of the writer who is the guiding intelligence that accompanies us through the Ravens TM season that I found this book so satisfying. This is the sports writer's version of Smith's excellent poem, *Druid Hill, 1969*, from his collection, *American Boy* (<http://tinyurl.com/m2tovam>). Dean Smith's book is about a

particular season, and a particular sport and a particular response to it. As the subtitle alerts us--this is a fan's book and so you will read about tackles and interceptions and personalities and antagonisms that are as much the gossip of daily human interaction as the local rag's police blotter or who got caught with whose wife in real life or on Mad Men. But what's most interesting is that it really is a book about how things mean to us; that is, it's a book about how we come to be both *local* and *global*. It's a book about growing up; it's a book about family; it's a book about community; it's a book about generational changes; it's a book about economic changes; it's a book about a changing city. All of this within the ambit of a personal relationship with a professional sports team. It's a book about how we mean to each other and ourselves and the way that our *common* bonds--such as being a fan of a sport, of a team, of a player, of a school--creates our community and brings us together for life. And if that is never easy it may at least be often pretty.

Dean Bartoli Smith does a fantastic job recapping the 2012-2013 championship season of the Baltimore Ravens. As Smith was going through the games, I was able to replay the highlights in my head that corresponded to the plays he was describing. He vividly recreated the season and it was so easy to fly through the pages of this book. Also, I loved his personal insight. By the end of the book it felt like I had known him and his family for ages. His stories and lesser known facts about some of the big names in Ravens history really pulled the book together for me. I would recommend this book to any Ravens fan. (Personal note: I ended up reading this book in conjunction with *Strength of a Champion* by O.J. Brigrance. They compliment each other perfectly.)

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
